

## **GCNA Bulletin Submission Guidelines**

### **Editorial Policy**

The *Bulletin* of the Guild of Carillonneurs in North America is a member-driven journal. The *Bulletin* encourages submissions on subjects including, but not limited to, carillon and campanological history, composer and performer biographies, musical criticism, GCNA and WCF congress reports, technical campanological research, book and recording reviews, and review articles. Although the *Bulletin* concentrates on practices, events, and people in North America, it welcomes submissions pertaining to the carillon throughout the world.

### **Submissions**

Authors should send proposals in an email message to Kimberly Schafer, editor of the *Bulletin*: [schaferk80@gmail.com](mailto:schaferk80@gmail.com). The proposal should be 100-500 words in length, provide an overview of the topic, and mention supporting photographs and other illustrations and figures that would accompany the article. Schafer will send the proposal to committee members for evaluation. After receiving the comments from the committee members, she will notify the author promptly. If the answer is affirmative, the author will then be asked to send the complete article in electronic form, preferably as a Microsoft Word file. A final evaluation of the article will then be made; an affirmative response to the proposal does not guarantee publication. All images should be scanned at a resolution of 300 dpi or higher and the files sent with the article. Scans of photographs should be in jpeg format. Some tables, music examples, and figures may be better sent as pdf files. Extensive formatting is not required, as the editor will apply the styles used by the *Bulletin*. Authors should use the source citations that follow. Footnotes are required, where appropriate; a bibliography is requested but not required. Authors will also be asked to sign a publication agreement.

### **Source Citation**

The *Bulletin* uses the notes and bibliography system explained in chapter fourteen of the *Chicago Manual of Style*, sixteenth edition. This system provides a method for writing footnotes and an optional end bibliography. Please see the *Chicago Manual of Style* website for a free citation quick guide:

Additional examples regarding basic footnote and bibliography formatting are available from Schafer.

The full bibliographic entry for a source needs to be given only once in the footnotes and once in the end bibliography. Complete information should appear in the first note in which the source is referenced, and subsequent notes should refer to the source in a shortened form. Source entries for footnotes and the end bibliography are formatted differently—both cases are given in the examples below. Entries for the end bibliography should be alphabetized according to the author's last name.

**Book with one or more authors.** The author's name(s) appears first, which is followed by the book title in italics. Next the facts of publication appear: the city of the publisher's main offices (usually listed first on the title or copyright pages), the name of the publisher, and the year of publication. In the second example the original years of the publication are followed by "repr." indicating that the book was reprinted. Following the publication information are the specific pages referenced. Note the placement of punctuation.

**Editor or translator in addition to an author.** The editor's and/or translator's name(s) follow the title of the book.

**Article in a journal.** After the journal title follows the volume number, then the issue number and year. The page numbers of the article follow the year.

**Article in a newspaper.** The author (if known), headline, month, day, and year should be included. Because a single paper may be published in several different editions, page numbers may be omitted. A website address should be provided if the article was viewed online.

**Website.** Include as much of the following information as possible: title or description of webpage, author, owner or sponsor of the site, and a URL. If possible, include a publication or revision date. If none is available, include an access date.

**Personal interview.** The person interviewed comes first, followed by the interviewer. The place and date of the interview should follow, if known.
